Question 7 - On November 13th or 14th, 1990, were you the one who shot Lyndel or Catherine Robertson?

Question 10 - Are you the one who shot Lyndel or Catherine Robertson on November 13th or 14th, 1990?

NOTE: Polygraph Examiner, Corporal M. W. Platte, conducted an independent evaluation of the polygraph charts and determined that Mr. Woodworth was being deceptive when responding to the above relevant questions.

4. During the post test phase of the examination, I advised Mr. Woodworth that he had lied to me and was responsible for shooting the Robertsons. I told him that when he came into the suite that there was only one person who knew the truth about his involvement in the shooting incident and that was him, but now two of us, he and I knew that he had shot the Robertsons. I told him it wasn't a question of who any longer, but rather a question of why he had shot the Robertsons. He nodded his head in an affirmative motion. When I asked him why he had shot them he said, "I didn't." I suggested to Mr. Woodworth that there were only two scenarios in the shooting and that he was either a cold-blooded murderer, liar and thief, or he was pressured for some unknown reason to shoot the Robertsons and Catherine accidentally died in the process. If he was a cold-blooded murderer and found guilty of capital murder, he could be taken and executed for the killing, but if the shooting and death were accidental, that was another situation all together. Mr. Woodworth responded, "Well, we all have to die some day."
